

Cheat Sheet For Common Law Review Footnote Citations

Short Form for Cases	Short forms may <u>only</u> be used if it clearly identifies a case in the same footnote or is cited (either in full or short form, including <i>id.</i>) in a manner such that it can readily be found in one of the <u>preceding five footnotes</u> . Otherwise, a <u>full citation is required</u> . Full citation case names are in plain text, short cites (case name or <i>id.</i>) are in italics. <i>Supra</i> is <u>not</u> used in cases.	1 United States v. Smith, 387 U.S. 1, 7 (1999). 2 Roe v. Charles A. Reich, <i>The New Property</i> , 73 YALE L.J. 733, 737-38 (1964).	Rule 16.3 (review Rule 16 for special situations (student authors, etc.)). Most abbreviations for periodicals are located in Table 13.
Nonconsecutively Paginated Journals, Magazines, and Newspapers (generally)	Author's Full Name, <i>Title of Article/Headline</i> , NAME OF MAGAZINE, Date, at Page Number. If no author, begin with the title of the article.	Seth Mydans, <i>Los Angeles Police Chief Removed for 60 Days in Inquiry on Beating</i> , N.Y. TIMES, Apr. 5, 1991, at A1. Barbara Ward, <i>Progress for a Small Planet</i> , HARV. BUS. REV., Sept.-Oct. 1979, at 89, 90.	Rule 16.4 (review Rule 16 for special situations (Editorials, Op-eds, etc.)).
Books	AUTHOR'S FULL NAME, TITLE OF BOOK_Page Number_(year). For original publications, no publisher is needed, but for editions by other than the original publisher, include the	HOWARD W. FUSON, JR., TELLING IT ALL: A LEGAL GUIDE TO THE EXERCISE OF FREE SPEECH 57-58 (1995).	Rule 15. There are several variations depending on whether there are translators or editors.
